Next hurdle is Norwood

NORWOOD captain-coach, Haydn Bunton, who was best on the ground at Norwood Oval today, runs for the ball as Bill Wedding shepherds off South ruckman Brian Roberts.

A record crowd of 14,052 at Glenelg Oval today saw the Tigers triumph over Torrens to retain their unbeaten record and clearly establish their ability to play a major role in the battle for the 1967 premiership.

The Bays won by 63 points, their third successive victory by more than 10 goals. Their dramatic rise to power will be challenged next week at Adelaide by Norwood, who outclassed South by a 45-point margin at Norwood. The Panthers without captain-coach Peter Darley were overwhelmed by the Redleg's big men and now have a tough fight ahead to get back into final four considerations. Drawn against Sturt at Unley next week, they have little hope of breaking through for their first win.

The Blues had a runaway win over Central at Elizabeth, while North, after a slow start, were too strong for Woodville. The day's closest result was at Richmond where Port's strong first quarter gave them enough in hand to hold off a fast-finishing West by two goals. At Glenelg, Rosewarne's success in cutting Head out of the game at centre was a big factor in the Bays' win. The evenness of Glenelg's team effort was an impressive feature. The ability of the Bay rucks to counter Norwood's Wedding, Chapman, and Woolford, could be the key to the result of next week's big game.

If the outcome in ruck is a stalemate then the ability of the rovers and ruckers to get the ball moving from the packs will be of the first importance. Both teams have rovers in form and everything points to a tremendous battle to retain the unbeaten record.

Pivot clash

North, the only other unbeaten side, put their record to the test at Alberton. The game will feature a clash between the year's outstanding recruit Barry Robran and John Cahill at the pivot. Robran today, for the second time in two games, forced two switches in an attempt to curb his influence on the game.

He may find that he will be called upon to defend more often against Cahill. Over the past few seasons, North have had some success against Port and although Anderson's absence will be felt in ruck, the Red and Whites should retain their unbeaten run.

A pleasing feature of South's game against Norwood was the improved form of Brian Roberts in ruck. Although finally overcome by weight of numbers, he responded well to the additional burden thrown on him by Darley's absence.

Provided Darley is available next week, the Panthers will match Sturt's rucks in the air, but the Blues' ability to take the ball away is their big strength. South half-forward flankers, Backman and Hendrie, today were not the force they were against North, and the ability of these two to get clear is important to the Panthers' prospects.

KERLEY TIGERS GO ROARING ON

The Bays came through their first big test against Torrens today in a manner that marks them clearly as a final four prospect.

Their efficiency in attack enabled them to be level with the Eagles at quarter time after losing the toss and they took control of the game with a powerful second term.

Torrens made an effort to bridge the gap in the third quarter but the Tigers were never seriously threatened.

They had no real weakness in winning their third game by more than 10 goals.

Lawrie Rosewarne succeeded handsomely in denying Lindsay Head any influence at centre and while the Torrens rucks got first touch often enough, the Eagles derived little benefit from it.

Head was switched to roving after half-time and Gould did better in his place but Rosewarne finished on strongly in a most impressive exhibition.

Torrens' attempt to counter Ray Button with John Graham was less successful.

Graham played well but Button was still a force in the Bays' attack.

The Bays lost Morony at the end of the first quarter and were forced

to switch Moss into ruck. If anything, Glenelg gained strength from the replacement.

Rostrevor College captain Peter Marker came on to a half-forward flank and was in the game at once.

He was switched to centre half-forward in the third quarter and finished with three goals.

Moss, too, played strongly in ruck, his ground play being particularly good.

In the first quarter Torrens had the chances to set up a three or four goal lead as Bills put them into attack and Kingston and Staker showed the way through half-forward.

But the Bay's determined tackling made openings of which they took full advantage to get four

goals from five shots.

Glenelg's big effort, inspired by Kerley, came as they turned with the breeze behind them in the second quarter.

Nullifying Torrens' rucks, winning across centre and kept in attack by the strength of Kerley and Blackburn, Glenelg took control of the game.

Richens had to battle to break clear from some close checking but Anesbury roved strongly as Glenelg broke away.

Torrens were restricted to a point for the quarter and that was rushed. Glenelg led them to the ball all over the ground.

Long's dash

When the Eagles did get within range, Doug Long cleared with great dash and judgment.

Glenelg asserted their superiority with a quick goal into the breeze in the third term and then went on the defensive.

Gould's switch to centre gave Torrens some drive



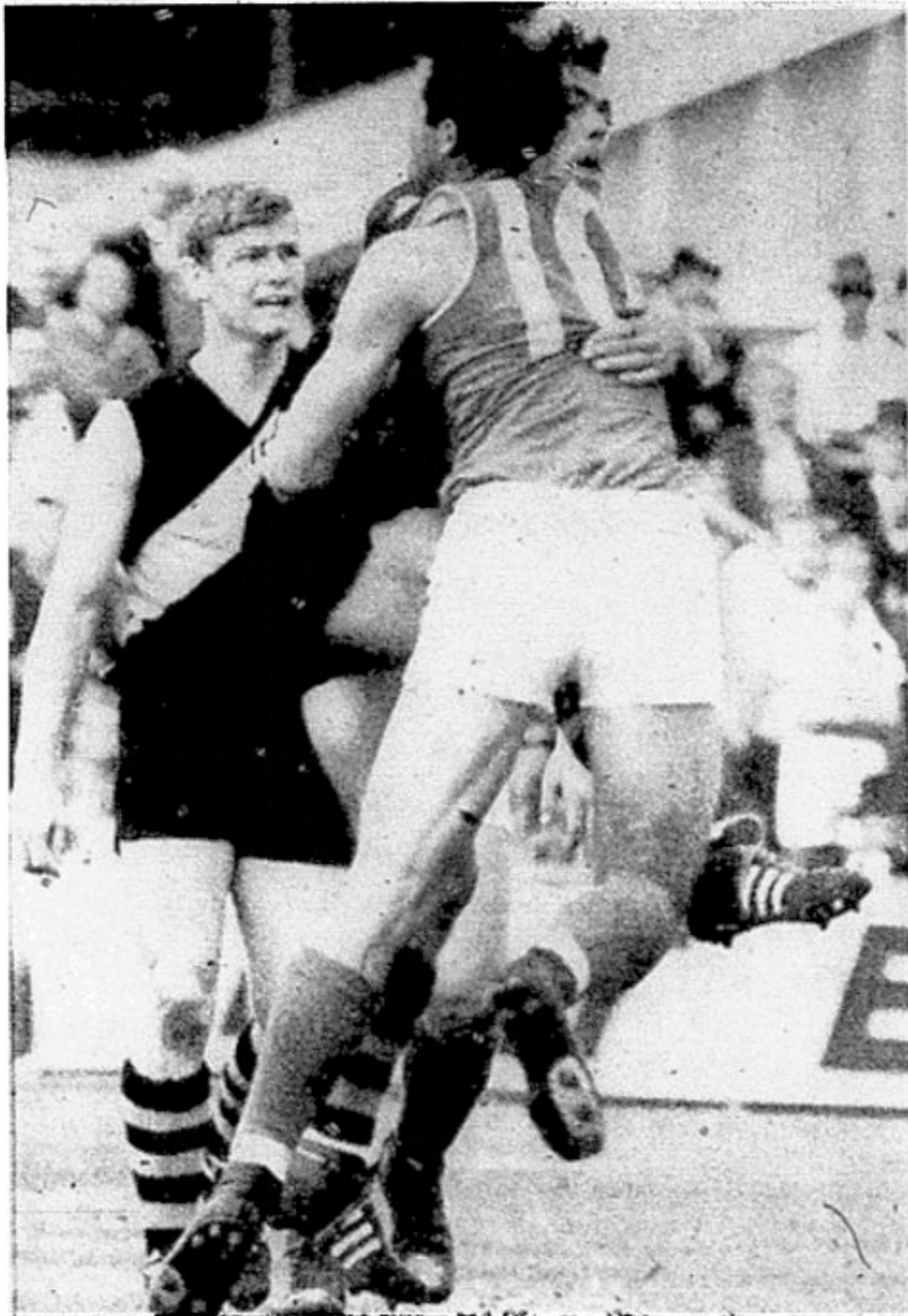

and Shepherd's elusiveness up forward brought the Eagles to within four goals at one stage.

However, Glenelg in control on the wings got three goals from the half-forward line and the run home was only a formality.

The Bays' superiority was emphasised as they had 15 scoring shots to two in the last quarter.
