Can Glenelg still get into the final four?

That is league football's most intriguing question after the Tigers' great 20-point win over Port in a thrilling contest at Glenelg Oval today.

Glenelg's shock win—they had 37 scoring shots to Port's 27—revived their flagging finals' hopes and confirmed that the Bays are the best side out of the top four.

The manner in which Glenelg met every Port challenge made mockery of the Tigers' sluggish start to the season.

To get Glenelg into the final four, coach Neil Kerley faces the most demanding challenge of his colorful and successful career.

In the remaining 11 minor round matches Glenelg still have to play top teams Sturt and North twice each, and meet Port again.

It is a tremendous contract to keep winning

But on their showing today, it is not an impossible one for the Tigers.

Of the top four teams, Norwood look the most vulnerable.

The Kedlegs still hold a three-win (six-point) break over Glenelg but they were not over-impressive in beating South by 32 points at Adelaide Oval today, following their previous three successive losses.

Not only do Glenelg have to bridge the three-game gap between them and Norwood, but they also have to overcome a much tougher draw
