STURT, BAYS FINAL LOOMS

A Glenelg-Sturt grand final looms larger.

This follows the Blues' 26-point win over North at Prospect Oval in yesterday's round.

With only five minor round series remaining before the first two finals on September 8, Glenelg and Sturt have established themselves as the two outstanding teams in the competition this year.

North's loss, their fifth this season, has left them only one win ahead of fourth-ranked Port, who

have a superior percentage.

The Roosters' main worry now is that they could lose the double chance to the Magpies.

The teams' draw for the rest of the minor round is:—

NORTH: South (Adelaide), Centrals (Prospect), Port (Prospect), Norwood (Adelaide), Centrals (Elizabeth).

PORT: Glenelg (Glenelg), Torrens (Alberton), North (Prospect), Centrals (Alberton), Norwood (Norwood).

Torrens have their eyes on fifth position. But it

would need a string of surprise results for the Eagles to steal fifth place away from Norwood or Centrals.

Big interest next Saturday centres on the Glenelg-Port clash at the Bay.

Port are hopeful Russell Ebert (cracked rib) will be able to resume after a two-match absence.

Glenelg have two injury worries — wingman John MacFarlane has a pulled hamstring muscle and rover Greg Bennett has a sprained ankle.

In addition, Tiger ruckman Bob Tardif dislocated a finger three times in the game against Centrals at Elizabeth yesterday.

Sorry affair

West and Woodville drew a paltry crowd of only 2,461 to Richmond Oval yesterday.

Only 1,680 spectators paid their admittance money.

The other 781 spectators entered the ground through season tickets and complimentary.

It was one of the poorest attendances in league history and a sad reflection on the drawing power of the two lowly-ranked clubs, who have the smallest followings of all 10 league clubs.

Predictably, traditional rivals Port and Norwood attracted most spectators — 14,300 — to yesterday's sixteenth series.

Tigers had to earn this win

A hard-fought four goal burst in the third quarter rescued Glenelg from possible defeat against a rugged and persistent Centrals at Elizabeth.

The easy kick was non-existent, both sides playing pressure football restricting the scoring to a minimum.

There were many strong body clashes which all day threatened to erupt into major skirmishes.

Both sides managed to "keep cool" and alert umpiring by Peter Mead kept the game clean.

Other ideas

The Bulldogs made Farnham and Reed reserves and with first use of a five-goal breeze they were expected to jump away to a handy first term lead over the Bays.

But Glenelg's defenders had other ideas. They raced the Bulldogs to the ball and tackled quickly and fiercely.

The Tiger tactics contained Centrals to three scattered points in the first 15 minutes, and the Bulldogs finished the quarter with only a 12 point lead.

Glenelg were also expected to bolt away with the breeze in the second term, but they too fell foul to similar defensive tactics employed by Centrals.

Hamilton finished the Bays' best with his centre performance, but Colbey was close on his heels with a fine half back job.
