Rewrite history books

In the most amazing Australian rules football game, Glenelg yesterday kicked a record 49-23 against Central Districts at Glenelg Oval.

The teams played an extra 41 min. 44 sec. as Glenelg ran riot to defeat Centrals by 238 points — the highest winning margin kicked in South Australian football.

Thousands of Glenelg supporters mobbed the players as they left the ground.

After the game each Glenelg player walked a guard of honor through wildly cheering spectators into a packed club dining room.

The Tigers missed kicking 50 goals when Glenelg wingman John MacFarlane's kick hit the left-hand post at the northern end of the ground as the siren sounded.

Their score beat the previous Australian record, 43-29, kicked by Port Melbourne, a Victorian Football Association team, against Sandringham in 1941.

It bettered by more than 15 goals SA's biggest match total.

This was set by North Adelaide at Adelaide Oval on May 13, 1972, when they defeated South Adelaide 34-22 to 6-12.

And to top it off, Glen-

elg's full forward, Fred Phillis, kicked 18-6 to bring his goal total this year to 110 (counting Datsun Cup matches).

Glenelg's total of goals yesterday from its four league teams and mini-league side amounted to a mighty 140.

The 60 goals kicked by both sides at Glenelg yesterday meant an average three goals scored every five minutes. Centrals scored 11-13.

Other records were:
●The match total of 396 points is an Australian record. It beats 344 points kicked this year when Norwood booted 26-22 to North Adelaide's 24-12.

●The 15-6 kicked by Glenelg in the last term is the highest scoring quarter in SA league football. It beats 14-10 kicked by West against North at Adelaide Oval in 1940.

●Phillis's 18-6 is a club record. His previous best was 15-0 against South in 1969.

●Glenelg's 25-12 is the highest score kicked by a team to half-time.

Phillis now ranks among the all-time goal-kicking greats.

His 18-6 has only been bettered by Ken Farmer, the great North Adelaide forward who kicked 23 in a match against Torrens at Prospect in 1940 and Norwood's Bruce Schultz, who notched 19 against Glenelg a year later.

Yesterday's round brought the highest total of points scored.

By Julian Swinstead, who played in the back pocket for Centrals.

It was like standing up against a wall and facing a machinegun loaded with footballs.

That was how it felt on the receiving end of the Glenelg onslaught against our young side.

What could you do? The Bays were in full flight and no matter what we tried we couldn't halt them.

I got a stiff neck from watching the ball shot from the centre to Fred Phillis, between the goal posts, to the boundary umpire and back to the centre for another bounce.

After Fred had booted his hundredth goal for the season and twelfth for the match, my opponent, Glenelg rover Bennett, turned, looked at me, threw his arms in the air, and said: "Incredible!"

It was a blow for us when Bill Cochrane, who was having a good tussle with Phillis, injured his ankle early in the second term and had to be carried off.

Spare a thought for young Gary Rae, who was on the bench and had to replace Cochrane on Phillis.

Fred's 200th game experience told on Gary's form.

This is what Centrals problem is.

With the seconds ticking away in the last term, there was only one thing Centrals could aim for—that was to keep Glenelg under the 50-goal mark.

The only encouraging thing for Centrals on the day was when MacFarlane's long torpedo shot, right on the siren, hit the post.

Fred burns his boots

Fred Phillis burnt his boots on Saturday night!

Not his magical golden boots, but the pair with which he kicked only 1-4 in the first quarter at the Bay Oval on Saturday.

The ceremonial "cremation" was performed by Fred and some of his Glenelg teammates at the Marino home of one of the Tigers' vice-presidents, Mr. Jack Evans.

Fred had not worn the black boots for some weeks. After the first quarter on Saturday, his feet were hurting and he had two blisters on his left foot.

So they were discarded for his favorite yellow pair.

In the last three quarters, Fred kicked 17-2 lifting his match tally to 18-6 of Glenelg's record-shattering 49-23 (317).

Fred will wear his yellow boots again against Torrens at Thebarton Oval on Saturday.

They should be preserved and enshrined at the Glenelg Footballers' Club, in tribute to a memorable performance in a never-to-be-forgotten match.

Staggering statistics

It was a mind-blowing experience for football statisticians as Glenelg crashed its way into the record books at Glenelg Oval on Saturday.

Glenelg smashed all previous tall scoring records into oblivion as it shattered the previous SA league record by more than 15 goals and the Australian record by five goals.

Poor Central District. Its players were absolutely demoralised by the goal-scoring blitz. Even Glenelg players after the game were stunned.

What can be said about a match that turned into such a debacle? Presumably, recite the statistics.

● Glenelg became the first league team to kick more than 300 points in a game.

● Its winning margin, naturally a record, eclipsed by 12 points the previous highest SA league score.

● Glenelg slammed through a goal at an average of every two minutes of playing time.

● It took 170 minutes to complete 100 minutes of football. The time

taken as boundary umpires ferried the ball back for centre bounces accounted for most of the 41 min. 34 sec. of "time on."

● Glenelg's 15.6 in the last quarter beat the previous best one-quarter score in SA — West's 14.10 against North in 1940.

What of the individual performances?

● Full forward Fred Phillis's 18.6 was his best, overshadowing his 15 against South six seasons ago.

● Ruckman Rob Tardif, whose dominance of the ruck duels began the stampede, accumulated 36 hit-outs.

● Peter Marker Bennett had 48 "touches" — 28 kicks and 20 handballs — but almost was matched by centreman Peter Marker's 26-21.

● Fred Phillis grabbed 17 marks around the goal-front.

● The goal umpires signalled a score at an av-

erage of every 62.5 sec. of playing time.

After the excitement of watching Glenelg kick 25 goals in the first half the second half became rather agonising, like watching a public slaughter.

Interest in the closing minutes centered on Glenelg's race to kick 50 goals. It ended as wingman John MacFarlane's flying shot hit a goalpost as the siren sounded.

Having seen the goal-scoring record established I don't want to be there when it is beaten.

I know I won't be. It will take more years than I have left.

Next week's final minor round series vitally involves the premiershop hopes of three teams.

With powerful percentages Glenelg (second) and Sturt (third) go into this round sitting like vultures on the outcome of the Norwood-Port clash.

If League leaders Norwood and Sturt will almost certainly shoot above them, depriving them of the minor round premiership and the much vaunted "dream-run" in the finals.

Sturt play Centrals at Footy Park and the Tigers have the "breather" with Torrens at Thebarton.

The word is out that "King" Kerley may have been saving the best from his boys for the final round.

The final five is now settled and this is my tip for the order... Glenelg, Sturt, Norwood, Port and North.

North will almost certainly be the wooden-spooners in the finals contest, and any one of the other four teams have a good chance of taking the flag.

With the Bay's Australian record score of 49-23 league sides produced the highest scoring round ever in SA with 1,366 points.

That's 204 goals and 142 points and beats the previous best set on May 3 this year and May 4 last year.

With Fred Phillis' 18 goals, from 28 kicks, and 17 marks, it beats his previous best goalscoring tally of 15 goals in 1969.

The Redlegs — despite the crucial game next week — can also polish their boots with pride because they also equalled a record with their win over West.

Norwood won their fifteenth straight game, not counting the Datsun Cup, to equal the same winning sequence they set in 1922-3.

On the other end of the record scale the crowd of 1,869 at Football Park sets an all time low in arrears of the previous lowest at West Lakes of 2,621.

West Adelaide centre half-back, Bruce Stevenson was reported for spitting at the height of a big melee at the Parade.

IT was certainly D. K.'s day at the Bay yesterday... D. K. (Fred Phillis) that is. The explosive Tiger full forward kicked the mammoth total of 18 goals 6 behinds in Glenelg's record score

Stunned, but crowd wanted more!

That's biased? So what? Right from the start when the Bays booted 12-6 for the first quarter the message was there: Glenelg the super side, Glenelg running riot, Glenelg really hotting it up for the finals.

How must the King feel? He's got his greats firing in magnificent form.

And how must Bulldog coach Tony Casserly feel?

He didn't have any real answers—the score showed that, but he did have a point when he said after the game that 11 players of the 20 had not played more than 20 league games.

Killer Phillis

That's not many, but as he said: "The loss will make them realise just how hard you need to work to become a truly great team." Fred Phillis, of course, was the killer of the Bulldogs.

Phillis had 28 kicks, 17 marks and seven handballs.

Glenelg's total number of kicks was 305. They amassed a mighty 187 handballs.

What can a team do when players such as Bob Tardif really hit their straps?

Then there was Peter Carey, booting eight goals from centre half-forward and MacFarlane, Marker and Copping raining kicks to the goalfront.

So you could go on through the Glenelg side... Rebbeck, Bennett, Cornes, Hodgeman, Wayne Phillis, the list goes on.

Centrals had only a few. Terry Moore battled his heart out in the ruck, and young Mark Norsworthy did his best.

Crushing

John Wyley was another to try all day.

The Tigers had 25 goals on the board at half-time, something never before seen in Australian football.

They then added another nine, before unleashing a crushing final quarter when they kicked 15-6 to 1-6 from the Bulldogs.

It could have been 50 goals to the Bays if that powerful punt from wingman John MacFarlane had not hit the post as the siren sounded.

To find where the game was won and lost is almost impossible, but the main drive must surely have come from the rucks, where Tardif and Collin Anderson were unbeatable.

You must remember, too, that it was Moore — allegedly one of South Australia's (and soon Victoria's) most capable ruckmen — that Tardif took on.

There's only one more thing anybody could say on such a game: I'm glad I saw it — for it won't happen again!
